Physical activity is beneficial for health, however there are limited opportunities for residents to safely access public streets for traffic-free cycling, skating or walking. This event allowed a safe alternative to enjoy local community shops and restaurants, while also highlighting the importance of active transportation as a viable alternative to automobiles.

# SGVCOG Staff Attends LABC 12th Annual Sustainability Summit:

On April 20th, SGVCOG staff attended the Los Angeles Business Council Sustainability summit. This summit has become a forum for promoting valuable partnerships between public policy makers, clean technology innovators and businesses. A key theme of the summit, was the demand for robust private-sector investment in clean energy solutions.

This year Senate President Pro Tem, Kevin De Leon provided a key note address that focused on a commitment to sustainability. Additionally, Oregon Governor Kate Brown, Washington Governor Jay Inslee and Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti sat on a panel the discussed how regional partnerships can help grow local economies, while continuing to maintain environmentally sustainable policies.

Looking ahead, as City Homeless Plans are completed, the COG will work with cities to develop and prioritize a comprehensive list of San Gabriel Valley projects and programs that will fit with the County's Homeless Initiative strategies.

## ACE Dedicates New Puente Avenue Grade Separation Project

On April 6<sup>th</sup>, the SGVCOG and the ACE Project celebrated the completion of the Puente Ave. Grade Separation Project, with a dedication ceremony. Many local and state-wide officials attended this momentous occasion. This project took nearly 3 years to complete at a cost of \$97.4 million. It is expected that traffic congestion will be reduced by an estimated 13 vehicle-hours each day. This will also help eliminate delays for emergency responders, reduce emissions and eliminate locomotive noise.
