TELECONFERENCING

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 21-01-CPCC making certain findings that the existence of a local and state of emergency in California caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to directly impact the ability of the SGVCOG to hold public meetings safely in person thereby necessitating an ability to continue holding meetings via teleconferencing.

BACKGROUND

Introduced by Assemblymember Robert Rivas (D-Hollister) on February 1, 2021, AB 361 codifies portions of Governor Gavin Newsom's existing Ralph M. Brown Act exemptions pertaining to teleconferencing if a local agency issues an emergency finding, and reissues it every 30 days, that it is unsafe to meet in person. Specifically, the Brown Act exemptions include requirements to provide a public teleconference location, to maintain a member quorum within the agency's jurisdiction and to provide for public comment at each teleconference location, such as a private residence. The legislation expires in December 2024. On September 16, 2021, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed AB 361 into law, effective immediately.

A local agency wishing to rely on the provisions of AB 361 must meet one of the following criteria:

- 1. The local agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing; or
- 2. The local holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; or
- 3. The local agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote, that, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a State of Emergency in California due to the threat of COVID-19 and shortly thereafter issued Executive Order N-29-20 suspending certain Brown Act provisions relating to teleconferencing as public meetings began to be held online.¹

¹ Similarly, on March 4, 2020, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and Los Angeles County Health Officer declared a local and health emergency due to the threat of COVID-19.



However, this Executive Order expired on September 30, 2021, despite the State of Emergency remaining in place.

The threat that COVID-19 has presented continues to directly impact the ability of the SGVCOG to conduct Governing Board/committee meetings safely in person. Updated guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Los Angeles Department of Public Health in July and August 2021 advise governmental entities to refrain from conducting indoor meetings and consider moving operations outdoors, where feasible, to prevent transmission. SGVCOG staff finds it has been unable to find a suitable outdoor space with the requisite audio/visual capabilities at which the monthly Executive Committee meetings can be held safely. Similarly, an indoor space with sufficient capacity to accommodate safe social distance practices among members, staff, and the public could not be identified

In order to continue to conduct meetings in a safe manner and to prevent unnecessary COVID-19 exposure to members, staff and the public, staff is recommending that the Capital Projects and Construction Committee adopt Resolution 21-01-CPCC making certain findings in order to be able to continue teleconferencing for its meetings.

RESOLUTION 21-01-CPCC

RESOLUTION OF THE CAPITAL PROJECTS AND CONSTUCTION COMMITTEE OF THE SAN GABRIEL VALLEY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS (SGVCOG) MAKING SPECIFIED FINDINGS TO ENABLE THE CAPITAL PROJECTS AND CONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE TO HOLD MEETINGS VIA TELECONFERENCING

WHEREAS, AB 361 (Rivas), and specifically Government Code section 54953 ("Section 54953"), authorizes local agencies to use teleconferencing without complying with the specified teleconferencing requirements imposed by the Ralph M. Brown Act when the legislative body of a local agency holds a meeting during a declared state of emergency and makes certain findings relating thereto; and

WHEREAS, Section 54953 allows for local agencies to teleconference if the legislative body finds, among other things, that state or local official continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing or whether a state of emergency directly impacts the ability of the legislative body to meet safely and that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of California proclaimed a State of Emergency to exist in California as result of the threat of COVID-19, which state of emergency remains in place; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and Los Angeles County Health Officer declared a local and health emergency as result of the threat of COVID-19, which emergency remains in place; and

WHEREAS, Los Angeles County and State health officials continue to recommend social distancing as a result of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, due to the resurgence of COVID-19 reported cases and surge of the Delta variant statewide and in particular, in Los Angeles County, the California Department of Public Health's Best Practice Guidance encourages all governmental entities to refrain from conducting indoor meetings and consider moving operations outdoors, where feasible, in order to prevent transmission; and

WHEREAS, SGVCOG's inability to facilitate Governing Board and Committee meetings using a centralized outdoor space with audio/visual capabilities, as well as the lack of indoor capacity to accommodate safe social distance practices among members and joining staff makes it unsafe for its members and the public to meet safely in person; and

WHEREAS, teleconferencing meetings enables the SGVCOG to retain the ability to continue to conduct meetings in a safe manner that would reduce exposure to members and staff to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, public access and participation remain a core value of the SGVCOG, and the SGVCOG has the capability to meet the requirements in Section 54953 to provide the public with the ability to view, hear, and participate in such meetings in a manner that protects the statutory and constitutional rights of all persons to participate in such meetings; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with specified Brown Act teleconference requirements, the SGVCOG must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists, and the SGVCOG Capital Projects and Construction Committee has done so.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Capital Projects and Construction Committee does hereby find the existence of a local and state of emergency in California caused by COVID-19 continues to directly impact the ability of the SGVCOG to hold public meetings safely in person and local and state health officials continue to recommend social distancing.



RE: E-BIKE PURCHASE

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Authorize the Executive Director to negotiate and execute agreement(s) for the purchase of e-bikes.

BACKGROUND

In August 2017, the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG) was awarded \$4.554 million in Active Transportation Program-Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (ATP-GGRF) funding by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to form a regional e-bike share program in the San Gabriel Valley. The program was to deploy 840 e-bikes in 15 participating jurisdictions, with at least 420 e-bikes serving disadvantaged communities (DACs). The program was to be a dock-less program so that users could return the e-bikes to any existing bike rack of identified bike parking location. Eligible expenditures for the funding including infrastructure (e.g. e-bikes; stations) and program start-up costs. Operations could not be covered under the grant funding. The funding was to be expended by December 17, 2021. In early 2019, the SGVCOG completed a competitive procurement process. At its February 2019 meeting, the Capital Projects and Construction Committee (CPCC) authorized the Chief Engineer to execute an Agreement with Gotcha Media Holdings, LLC for the program. The GoSGV Program – as the regional e-bike share program was named – launched approximately 45 e-bikes in 2 cities in the summer of 2020. As reported to the CPCC, in January 2021, the SGVCOG was notified that Gotcha had essentially dissolved and operations for all of its programs nationwide – including the program in the San Gabriel Valley - had ceased.

In spring 2021, SGVCOG staff convened discussions with regional stakeholders, including local non-profits and participating cities, to discuss how the program could be re-launched. As previously discussed with the Committee, SGVCOG determined that the best approach was to modify the program to allow users to check-out the e-bikes for longer periods and to focus stations on locations not located on the public right-of-way. Potential stations could also include local non-profits and businesses where users could check-out the e-bikes. To ensure adequate time for the re-launched program, staff submitted a 12-month funding extension request to the CTC in April 2021. This would have extended the funding deadline to December 17, 2022. In late September 2021, staff was notified that, due to statutory requirements for expending the grant funds, the request was denied. As such, funds must be expended by December 17, 2021.

Since the grant is only for capital expenditures, such as e-bikes and stations, eligible infrastructure must be purchased by that date. That does not mean that the program needs to be operational by



that date. Caltrans staff is extremely interested in ensuring that the SGVCOG can implement the program and has been working with staff to ensure that the funds can be expended.

DISCUSSION

In September 2021, staff released a request for quotes (RFQ) for the purchase of 840 e-bikes. The RFQ requested quotes for both e-bikes and cargo e-bikes. These e-bikes will be used by the program operator – to be selected under a separate request for proposals (RFP) – to implement the program. Potential program operators were also invited to submit proposals for e-bikes. One of the primary concerns for the program was the availability of e-bikes. There continue to be worldwide shortages of e-bikes and extremely long timeframes for delivery. Bids were due on October 12, 2021.

The SGVCOG received 4 responsive bids. The Technical Evaluation Committee (TEC) included SGVCOG staff and a subject-matter expert on bikes and e-bikes. Based on the TEC's evaluation, two notices of intent (NOI) were issued on Friday, October 15, 2021, to the following vendors:

- B-Cycle: purchase of e-bikes;
- Pedal Movement, LLC: purchase of cargo e-bikes.

In October 2021, staff also released an RFP for a program operator to administer the program, with responses due by October 26, 2021. Because the SGVCOG has a longer timeline for selecting a program operator, this contract for program operations will be presented to the CPCC for consideration at an upcoming meeting. The program operator will be responsible for designing and implementing the program consistent with the SGVCOG's desired approach.

SECTION I: INSTRUCTIONS TO PROPOSERS

Intent

The San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG) is a joint powers authority (JPA) made up of thirty-one cities, three Los Angeles County supervisorial districts, and three municipal water districts in the San Gabriel Valley. The SGVCOG is a regional planning agency that coordinates with its member agencies to plan and implement projects of regional significance, in the areas of housing and homelessness, transportation, water, solid waste, and energy.

The SGVCOG was awarded Active Transportation Program (ATP)-Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) funding by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to implement a 3-year pilot regional e-bike share program in the San Gabriel Valley. At full build-out, the program must provide a minimum of 840 e-bikes, with at least 420 bikes serving disadvantaged communities (DACs), in at least 15 San Gabriel Valley cities. In implementation, users will be able to check-out e-bikes for longer rental terms from stations/mobility hubs that are not located within the public right-of-way. The SGVCOG is willing to incorporate a variety of e-bikes, including foldable e-bikes and cargo e-bikes.

The SGVCOG will release a separate request for proposals to determine the program operator of the regional e-bike share program. The program operator will be responsible for operating the program using the e-bikes purchased as a result of this RFQ. Potential program operators can respond to this RFQ to provide e-bikes.



Scope of Work and Minimum Specifications

The SGVCOG would like to purchase 800 e-bikes and 40 cargo e-bikes. These e-bikes will be utilized to operate the regional program. The SGVCOG would like to incorporate a combination of E-Bikes and cargo E-bikes.

The SGVCOG is looking to purchase as many e-bikes and cargo e-bikes as possible from a single vendor. However, vendors can propose fewer than 800 e-bikes and do not have to propose both e-bikes and cargo e-bikes. For e-bikes, vendors must propose in increments of 50 and may not propose providing fewer than 50 e-bikes. The quote form in Appendix C should indicate the



anticipated delivery schedule for shipments of e-bikes. Vendors can propose fewer than 40 cargo e-bikes but must propose in increments of 10 and may not propose fewer than 10 cargo e-bikes.

Delivery Location

The e-bikes are expected to be delivered to the San Gabriel Valley.

Schedule of Deliveries

The SGVCOG desires to receive at least 25% of the bikes by no later than March 1, 2022. However, given the supply chain issues being experienced across commodities due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the SGVCOG maintains flexibility in what this amount will actually be.

The SGVCOG desired schedule to receive the e-Bikes in the following milestones:

- 25% of the e-Bikes by March 1, 2022
- 75% of the e-Bikes by June 30, 2022
- 100% of the e-Bikes by September 30, 2022.

The SGVCOG desires to receive 100% of the e-Bikes by no later than September 30, 2022.

BACKGROUND

Each month the Director of Capital Project provides an update on key programs. Committee members may contact staff for clarifications on any of the reported items prior to the scheduled meeting. The following are items of note since the last meeting:

I. PROJECTS

SR57/60 Confluence Chokepoint Relief Program

On September 16, the Governing Board approved Funding Agreement No. 2 between SGVCOG and Metro for the reimbursement of direct costs associated with property acquisitions, utility relocations and construction of the Diamond Bar Golf Course Improvements (Golf Course Project) as part of the State Route 57/60 Chokepoint Relief Program. On October 19, the County Board of Supervisors approved the acceptance of \$28.25 million in exchange for the 9.13 acres of lost park land. The Right of Way (ROW) acquisitions and design work for the Freeway Improvements are on-going. Staff will provide an overview on the outreach efforts in relations to the golf course closure and the upcoming construction activities during the Committee meeting.

Fullerton Road Grade Separation Completion Project

Subsequent to the contract awards to Skanska and AECOM, staff have been working closely with contractors on preconstruction related issues and requirements. Following the issuance of a full Notice to Proceed (NTP) in November, contractors will begin construction activities on the job site.

II. FUNDING

No new activities to report.

CONTRACTING

The SGVCOG has delegated to the Executive Director or the designee the authority to approve new contracts or change orders for previously approved contracts within certain limits, with a requirement that staff formally report such contract action.


