### **PRESENTATIONS**

S. 1272 Drone Federalism Act: Presentation by Brad Jensen, Economic Partnership
The federal legislation includes overarching restrictions on flying drones near buildings, above certain speeds, and while under the influence. Control over national airspace remains with the FAA. Local agencies retain control over public safety restrictions and flight under 200 feet. Also,

- included in S. 1272 is a section on developing best practices in conjunction with local and state governments.
- 6. SB 1241, Fire Hazard Planning and Mitigation: Presentation by Heather McCulley, CALFIRE The presentation covered the land use planning aspects of SB 1241. Under a CALFIRE program, the agency is trained and funded to work with local agencies to develop the fire hazard planning element of a city's safety element. CALFIRE encouraged the planners to take advantage of the state resources available to them through this program.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

- **8.** SB 649 (Hueso): small cell sites
  - L. Stevens discussed the current status of the bill and the likelihood that it will advance in the Assembly. The group considered the impact on cities should the SB 649 become law. Since the cell hardware is small and only works line-of-sight, cities with hilly terrain can expect to receive requests for numerous sites. Some cities have been approached by a company offering to "help" them navigate this process. C. Hensley offered a motion recommending that the COG take an oppose position unless the bill is amended to include:
  - An opportunity for cities to review all applications for small cell installation.
  - The right of cities to dictate the aesthetics of a small cell site.
  - The right of cities to charge fees according to their normal practice.
  - A period of six to nine months after passage to allow cities to put in place local ordinances addressing such things as aesthetics and fees.

There was a motion to recommend that the Governing Board oppose SB 649 unless amended as specified above (M/S: C. Hensley/A. Harbin).

• Enhance the emergency shelter system, enhanced to be an effective point-of-access to and component of an integrated homeless services system.

### • E14 - Enhanced Services for Transition Age Youth

Provide additional funding to support the expansion of the Youth Coordinated Entry System (CES) and programs providing housing Item #5 navigation, access/drop-in centers, shelter, after care/case management and transitional housing for youth.

- D4 Regional Integrated Re-entry Networks
  - Incorporate a focus on homeless individuals into the multi-disciplinary, clinically-focused Regional Integrated reentry networks and include seamless sharing of patient records between jail medical and behavioral health services and network providers.

  - The Public Defender will work with clients to provide assistance in resolving warrants and to provide other legal assistance to seek legal reductions and dismissals.

  - Enhancement could be implemented by DPSS as an augmentation of the existing General Relief Opportunities for Work (GROW) subsidized employment program with the South Bay Workforce Investment Board (SBWIB).
